





- What are the potential connections and collaborations you would like to pursue?
- Who else should be part of the conversation?
- How do communities engage as full partners in defining and advancing the goals?
- What changes would be needed to enable these collaborations to take root?

- What information relating to collective impact is currently gathered and synthesized?
- How could information gathering improve collaboration, integration, and sustainability?
- What kinds of information would you like to have on an ongoing basis?
- How could information gathering be integrated into ongoing work?
