Partnerships in Youth Development is an initiative of The Rutgers University-Newark Honors Living and Learning Community (HLLC) to build leadership exchanges between students in South Africa and Namibia with students in the United States. Rutgers University-Newark graduate and undergraduate students will be the primary moderators of these exchanges. The project has four components: 1) a research project on youth leadership; 2) a curriculum development component; 3) a digital exchange component; 4) an exploration of the feasibility of exchange opportunities.

PARTNERSHIPS IN YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Project Description

Partnerships in Youth Development is a project of The Rutgers University-Newark RU-N Honors Living - Learning Community (HLLC) to build leadership exchanges between students in South Africa and Namibia with students in the United States. RU-N graduate and undergraduate students will be the primary moderators of these exchanges. At its core the HLLC is committed to operationalizing our concept of "local citizenship in a global world", which is the title of the foundational course for our curriculum. We believe that international exposure and cross cultural competence are important aspects of internationalization. HLLC established in 2015 is an emerging national honors program model. We aim to use this sponsored research opportunity to build out two options of our required Capstone project (short term service learning and semester long study abroad).

Why a Leadership Development Network

Identifying strategies for increasing the leadership capabilities of young people is an increasingly important community need recognized in nations around the world. The three countries where *Partnerships in Youth Development* will be piloted, the United States, South Africa, and Namibia, have witnessed explorations of strategies for empowering youth to engage with local, national, and international actors in the hopes of enacting change in their countries and on a global scale. In Namibia, the structure of youth development interventions, and the general approach of the Namibian government towards youth issues, reflects a clear disconnect between the youth and the power they have to influence their own lives. Similarly, young South Africans are existing in an interesting time between the history of apartheid and its socio-economic aftermath. Overall, many government officials view disconnected youth as "problems" to be solved and exclude such young South Africans from decisions affecting their own futures. In the U.S. challenges in developing leadership programs through civic engagement aimed at exposing young American youth to international cultures and students have arisen as communities have sought strategies for engaging youth in pressing areas of concern.

Partnerships in Youth Development will provide a vehicle for reflection and action around engaging youth in multiple countries in comparative leadership development strategies under the guidance of university mentors.

Project Components and Outcomes

There are four primary components to Partnerships in Youth Development. They are:

Component 1 - Research on Leadership and Youth Development: The first component of *Partnerships in Youth Development* will consist of the implementation of a research agenda on matters of

youth leadership. This includes the critical question of defining and identifying "youths" in cross cultural contexts. A team of faculty and graduate students from several divisions of Rutgers University-Newark will drive the research. This team of research collaborators will work closely with a team of undergraduate students from the HLLC to build a comparative research agenda around facilitating and enabling the emergence of youth leadership in communities around the world.

Outcome to Component 1: A research project on comparative strategies around youth leadership development.

Component 2 - Curricular Development on Youth Leadership: The second component of *Partnerships in Youth Development* will focus on the development of curriculum on leadership development. An initial team of graduate and undergraduate students will engage in reflective exercise with faculty, students, and youth development professionals in partner organizations around matters related to youth development. An interdisciplinary approach will incorporate different disciplines to address the issues faced by the youth from all three countries. Central to the proposed leadership curriculum is a focus on the roles youth can play in transforming communities. Much of this curriculum will focus on exploring ways that young people find a comparative framework for engaging in community change in their respective nations.

Outcome to Component 2: Curriculum that can be led by Rutgers University-Newark students on matters pertaining to youth leadership.

Component 3 - Digital platform for participants: The third component of *Partnerships in Youth Development* will be a digital platform that participating youth will be able to join to engage in leadership explorations. Students from Rutgers University-Newark will facilitate the various digital exchanges between the youth in Newark, South Africa, and Namibia.

Outcome to Component 3: A platform for digital learning and exchange for youth from across international settings.

Component 4: Explorations of the Feasibility of Exchange Opportunities

The fourth component of *Partnerships in Youth Development* will consist of the exploration of exchange opportunities for teams of Rutgers University-Newark students, local youth, and youth from the partner communities in South Africa and Namibia. The feasibility analysis will consist of conducting an assessment of staffing needs, cost of exchanges, time-frame, and curricular needs.

Outcome to Component 4: A feasibility analysis (including cost needs and fundraising strategy) for student and/or youth exchange to South Africa and potentially Namibia

Project Timetable

Partnerships in Youth Development is a two year project that will begin in April of 2018. Components will run simultaneously.

Initiatives Leading to the Work:

Partnerships in Youth Development is the result of several Rutgers University-Newark initiatives that have been developing in Southern Africa over the past several years. They include:

USAID-supported Fellowship in South Africa: For the past three years, Rutgers University-Newark, in collaboration with Rutgers Global has had over twenty students participate in a USAID supported fellowship program (it is anticipated that an additional six students will participate in the summer of 2018). The students have been critical in building connections with community and youth service organizations in South Africa. Many of these organization, we anticipate having as collaborating agencies working with Partnerships in Youth Development.

US-SA University Partnership Initiative: In May 2016, Rutgers University-Newark was asked by then South African Minister of Higher Education and Training Blade Nzimande to serve as the host of a network of U.S. institutions of higher education that would collaborate with South African institutions of higher education on exchange opportunities for faculty and students. Since then, Rutgers-Newark has been engaging with representatives from the South African Ministry of Higher Education and Training, the South African Embassy, several universities in South Africa, and several universities in the United States in the establishment of this network.

Cornwall Center and HLLC to South African Partners: In May of 2017, Michael Simmons of the Cornwall Center and Timothy Eatman, Dean of the Honors Living-Learning Community participated in a visit to Cape Town, South Africa where they had an opportunity to meet with various representatives working in the education fields. During this time, Michael Simmons participated in the planning meeting of the After School Game Changers initiative. (See below)

After School Game Changers, Practitioner Training Initiative: Rutgers University-Newark holds a seat on the steering committee of the After School Game Changers, Practitioner Training Initiative, an initiative of South Africa's Western Cape Government which aims to ensure quality after school programs for 112,000 students in South Africa's Western Cape. As members of the committee, Rutgers-Newark collaborates in the creation of professional development opportunities for staff working in after school efforts, and assist in infrastructure development for nongovernmental organizations working in the after school arena.

Namibian After School Partnerships: For the past several years, Rutgers University-Newark and Namibia's Physically Active Youth (PAY) Program, have been exploring partnerships in the area of youth development. In 2016, Lindsey McDougle, assistant professor in the School of Public Administration and Affairs and member of the HLLC curriculum team evaluated the work of PAY. Also in 2016, the PAY founder Marie-Jeanne Ndimbira was recruited for the Global Urban Studies doctoral program, where she is currently a student.

Mamelodi Collaborative: In November 2017, Rutgers University-Newark and the University of Pretoria received a \$100,000 planning grant from the Kresge Foundation to support a project known as the Mamelodi Collaborative, which is an anchor institution-based collaborative focused on the Mamelodi Township, which exists slightly outside of the Pretoria metropole.
